REFLECTIONS

There has been much talk of slavery in recent weeks, and in our first reading today, Paul uses the word eight times. Of course, in Roman society, slavery was a common practice, and his readers in the fledgling church will have been familiar with it – some will even have been slaves or owned slaves themselves. As he says, he is speaking to them in human – and contemporary - terms to help them to understand point he is making here. He outlines a stark contrast – they are either slaves to sin, or to righteousness. In the final verse, one beloved of wayside preachers, he declares that the result of one road is death – of the other, eternal life

So what are we to make of this? Quite rightly, we have been urged to lament the sins of our past, which continue to the present day, particularly in relation to racism. Yet do we leave it there? In our context, racism is only one of many ways in which we continue corporately to become wealthy at the expense of others, allowing self-interest to dominate. I am sure that you can think of many contemporary examples, just as I can.

Paul speaks of righteousness as the opposite of sin, and the Bible frequently speaks of righteousness, or justice, as what God demands (*Micah 6: 8*)). Gaining at the expense of other people is not God's way. This is true both at the level of society and international relations and at an individual level. Rather than exploiting others, we are to welcome and respect them in God's name.

So Paul urges us to become slaves not of the sin of self-interest, but of the justice sought by God. With Paul, the wayside preacher urges passers by to repent and change their allegiance, giving their lives to God and behaving in ways that flow from that commitment and from understanding of scripture. Yet for many people the change is more gradual: seeing the detrimental effects of exploitation, and changing the ways in which we treat others, can lead to reflection and change at a deeper level. We become what we do, and as we welcome him in the stranger, God works within us to open us up to eternal life. For exploitation does not only disadvantage the one who is exploited – it not only flows from, but also reinforces, spiritual malaise in those who are responsible.

Going deeper

In our Gospel reading, there are echoes of Matthew 25 (31- end). In the context of today's readings, it is worth re-reading Jesus's powerful parable of the sheep and the goats and the challenge within it, perhaps alongside the short book of the prophet Micah.

The words that Paul uses make it clear that we cannot **earn** eternal life, even if we are enslaved to God and follow his path of righteousness. Eternal life is his free gift. By contrast spiritual death is described as the 'wages' of sin, the consequence of seeking our own self interests.

I wonder.... What aspects of our behaviour as individuals are we being called to change in response to today's readings?

Collect

Almighty God, you have broken the tyranny of sin and have sent the Spirit of your Son into our hearts whereby we call you Father: give us grace to dedicate our freedom to your service, that we and all creation may be brought to the glorious liberty of the children of God; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading: Romans 6.12-23

Do not let sin exercise dominion in your mortal bodies, to make you obey their passions. No longer present your members to sin as instruments of wickedness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and present your members to God as instruments of righteousness. For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under grace. What then? Should we sin because we are not under law but under grace? By no means! Do you not know that if you present yourselves to anyone as obedient slaves, you are slaves of the one whom you obey, either of sin, which leads to death, or of obedience, which leads to righteousness? But thanks be to God that you, having once been slaves of sin, have become obedient from the heart to the form of teaching to which you were entrusted, and that you, having been set free from sin, have become slaves of righteousness. I am speaking in human terms because of your natural limitations. For just as you once presented your members as slaves to impurity and to greater and greater iniquity, so now present your members as slaves to righteousness for sanctification. When you were slaves of sin, you were free in regard to righteousness. So what advantage did you then get from the things of which you now are ashamed? The end of those things is death. But now that you have been freed from sin and enslaved to God, the advantage you get is sanctification. The end is eternal life. For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Gospel: Matthew 10.40-42

'Whoever welcomes you welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me. Whoever welcomes a prophet in the name of a prophet will receive a prophet's reward; and whoever welcomes a righteous person in the name of a righteous person will receive the reward of the righteous; and whoever gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones in the name of a disciple - truly I tell you, none of these will lose their reward.'

MINISTER'S LETTER

Dear Friends

With churches poised to re-open, albeit initially in a limited way, I have been thinking a lot about the role of technology in our church life. I confess to be something of a dinosaur, and have often thought that mobile phones and social media can do more to separate us in real terms than to bring us together. The common sight of friends meeting for a meal out whilst all on their separate phones is an example. And how do 'virtual friends' compare with real ones that you can laugh with, and even – in time – hug?

Yet experience of zoomed services is challenging my thoughts about how we go forward as a Church. It has both pros and cons. On the plus side, it has been great to be able to worship across our churches, with people from St Mary's alongside folk from the village churches, instead of in our separate groups. I have come to know a few more people who worship elsewhere. The YouTube service frees me up to take part in a different way, at a time that may suit me better. In Birmingham, a friend who is in a wheelchair has been able to read in church on-line with ease. I know too that a number of people have taken advantage of the opportunity to join worship from elsewhere – perhaps somewhere they lived previously. The downside is that I miss all members of our Ashdon community, especially those unable to access the internet in this way. And conversation is limited by the sheer size of the virtual congregation - lots of waves and smiles, but little or no room for private conversation or sharing of confidences.

So where do we go from here? Just back to our separate communities? Surely not. A mixed economy may be possible, retaining some forms of on-line worship. I don't know the answer. The Diocese is planning a series of events for clergy and others, to reflect on how the church may change after lockdown. Permission to re-open for worship is one thing, but only prayerful discussion will show us the ways in which to be church in a post COVID world. Much as we may long for things to be as they were, we will need to ask for God's spirit and for confidence to move forward positively in ways that may initially not feel comfortable for many of us.

On a completely different subject, please remember in prayer Mina Smallman, former Archdeacon of Southend, whose 2 daughters were tragically killed recently in North London. I did not know Mina personally but valued the contribution she made to some of the Pilgrim study course videos.
