

## REFLECTIONS

Calling attention to another person's faults is always fraught with danger for both parties and can easily result in broken relationships that may never heal. Those of a critical persuasion can cause havoc in a church through their eagerness to point out others' failings. The harm done may not be lessened by adding the remark: 'Of course, I tell you this in love brother!' However, there are times when things cannot be left unsaid. Here the text gives us a three-fold pattern to follow: firstly person to person contact, if necessary involve two or three witnesses, before finally going to the Church as a whole, if matters are unresolved. An essential element that is missing here is the need to practise constant forgiveness. This is addressed in the verses that follow this reading as Jesus lays out the Christian disciple's obligation to go on forgiving again and again, seventy times seven times.

In our epistle reading Paul focusses on the centrality of love for our neighbours: 'Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law.' (Romans 13.8) These are not just warm words, they require practical action, which in Paul's eyes will fulfill much of the purpose for which the Law was given. There is an urgency about Paul's appeal, because none of us knows how long we have left, whether that be because of the Lord's return or our own final departure. There is no time like the present for showing love in action.

### I wonder...

What would it mean for me to daily 'clothe myself with the Lord Jesus Christ' (cf. Romans 13.14, NIV translation)? How will that affect my attitudes and actions?

### Collect

Almighty God, who called your Church to bear witness that you were in Christ reconciling the world to yourself: help us to proclaim the good news of your love, that all who hear it may be drawn to you; through him who was lifted up on the cross, and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

### First Reading: *Romans 13.8-14*

Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. The commandments, 'You shall not commit adultery; You shall not murder; You shall not steal; You shall not covet'; and any other commandment, are summed up in this word, 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' Love does no wrong to a neighbour; therefore, love is the fulfilling of the law. Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armour of light; let us live honourably as in the day, not in revelling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in quarrelling and jealousy. Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires.

### Gospel: *Matthew 18.15-20*

Jesus spoke to his disciples. 'If another member of the church sins against you, go and point out the fault when the two of you are alone. If the member listens to you, you have regained that one. But if you are not listened to, take one or two others along with you, so that every word may be confirmed by the evidence of two or three witnesses. If the member refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church; and if the offender refuses to listen even to the church, let such a one be to you as a Gentile and a tax-collector. Truly I tell you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven. Again, truly I tell you, if two of you agree on earth about anything you ask, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven. For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them.'

### Post Communion

God our creator, you feed your children with the true manna, the living bread from heaven: let this holy food sustain us through our earthly pilgrimage until we come to that place where hunger and thirst are no more; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

## MINISTER'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

I have it on good authority that the Chinese character for crisis is made up of two separate characters: one for danger and the other for opportunity. This has relevance for us on several levels as we face many crises today that require radical action, not least the sharp decline in church attendance in this country.

A book by Nick Page called *The Church Invisible* describes a sci-fi journey 40 years into the future where the hero wakes up in a Britain in which the Church has all but disappeared. It's a bleak vision which, of course, is really the author's critique of today's Church. An imaginary theologian closes each chapter with a commentary that ranges over current attendance to likely future models of church life. I was particularly struck by the fictional professor's hunch as to what would be the defining qualities of a church that might just make it into the future: small but powerful; passionately committed; based around relationships; lightly led; connected with life; missionary by default; full of creativity; engaged with the culture; unburdened by buildings; a place of refuge. It was thought provoking stuff even if I didn't agree with all its analyses and solutions.

A key piece of advice that gets sent back from the future is 'Love people until they ask why.' What a challenge! And it resonated for me with something remarkable that Justin Welby said in Chelmsford Cathedral some years ago: 'the church should always be engaged in doing things that make no sense if God does not exist'. To resolve to do such things would mean daring to cross social and cultural boundaries, thinking out of the box, and looking afresh at some of the things we take for granted.

All clergy are called 'to proclaim the gospel afresh in every generation' and all laity are called by their baptism to share in every aspect of that mission. This will inevitably mean much innovation, whilst not throwing the baby out with the bath water. Crisis can mean danger, but it can also bring opportunity for renewal and growth. If the Church in England takes this to heart it can, with God's grace, remain an agent for health in our addicted society. It may certainly look very different. To misquote Dr McCoy (of the real Star Trek!), time travellers will look and say 'It's the Church, Jim, but not as we know it.'
