REFLECTIONS

No Jewish hearer of today's gospel passage would have failed to recognise that Jesus' parable was a picture of God and his people, Israel. The landowner (God) had planted a vineyard (God's people), and leased it to tenants (Israel's leaders). Those tenants had enjoyed privileged use of the vineyard, but consistently rejected and abused slaves (the prophets) sent by the landowner. The identity of the owner's son is crystal clear: Jesus himself. The parable was given in the context of the growing tensions between Jesus and the Jewish religious establishment. Not only had the leaders failed to heed the prophets' warnings, but also to welcome God coming to them in the ministry of Jesus. As a consequence the kingdom would be given to others, to those producing 'the fruits of the kingdom'. Salvation is no longer through the biblical nation of Israel but through another nation made up of Jews and Gentiles, all those who come to recognise the lordship of Jesus Christ.

Going deeper...

The rejected son of the parable becomes the rejected stone in a quotation from Psalm 118, written to celebrate Israel's deliverance from her enemies. Jesus uses it here to indicate his ultimate victory over death, through his resurrection on Easter Day: though rejected by the people he came to, Jesus becomes the chief cornerstone of a new Temple, his Church.

I wonder...

What does it mean for me to make Jesus Christ the cornerstone of my life?

Collect

Almighty God, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless till they find their rest in you: pour your love into our hearts and draw us to yourself, and so bring us at last to your heavenly city where we shall see you face to face; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

First Reading: Philippians 3.4b-14

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead. Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on towards the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

Gospel: Matthew 21.33-46

Jesus said to the chief priests and the elders of the people: 'Listen to another parable. There was a landowner who planted a vineyard, put a fence around it, dug a wine press in it, and built a watch-tower. Then he leased it to tenants and went to another country. When the harvest time had come, he sent his slaves to the tenants to collect his produce. But the tenants seized his slaves and beat one, killed another, and stoned another. Again he sent other slaves, more than the first; and they treated them in the same way. Finally he sent his son to them, saying, "They will respect my son." But when the tenants saw the son, they said to themselves, "This is the heir; come, let us kill him and get his inheritance." So they seized him, threw him out of the vineyard, and killed him. Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?' They said to him, 'He will put those wretches to a miserable death, and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will give him the produce at the harvest time.' Jesus said to them, 'Have you never read in the scriptures: "The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; this was the Lord's doing, and it is amazing in our eyes"? Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that produces the fruits of the kingdom. The one who falls on this stone will be broken to pieces; and it will crush anyone on whom it falls.' When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard his parables, they realized that he was speaking about them. They wanted to arrest him, but they feared the crowds, because they regarded him as a prophet.

MINISTER'S LETTER

Dear Friends.

So far in our journey through Paul's letter to the Philippians, the theme of humility has been a key focus. Last week it was the great hymn of praise to Christ's humility: Jesus didn't regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave and being born in human likeness (Phil. 2:6,7). This week Paul describes his own approach to humility: his determination to put aside everything that has gone before and which has made up his previous status, in order that he may know Christ Jesus as his Lord. His background, his education, his standing in society, all these were things of the past; all that mattered now was his new identity in Christ.

No one enjoys people who are consumed with themselves. One US President, who shall remain nameless, was once asked about his own humility. He remarked: 'I think I am actually humble. I think I'm much more humble than you would understand.' On the other hand, when we come across someone with genuine humility we find ourselves drawn to them. I'm sure that we would all like to make progress in the humility stakes, but true humility is an elusive thing: as soon as we think we might be making progress with it, we are done for! It just cannot be gained by going at it directly, the more we attempt to pursue it, the more it retreats from us.

The Quaker Thomas Kelly wrote: 'Humility rests upon a Holy blindness, like the blindness of him who looks steadily into the sun. For wherever he turns his eyes on earth, there he sees only the sun. The God-blinded soul sees naught of self, naught of personal degradation or of personal eminence, but only the Holy Will.' Clearly Paul would have understood this, for he desired that the person of Christ should not be simply a part of his field of view, but that Christ would fill his entire vision. He set his eyes on Jesus alone, and so should we. As the old chorus goes: 'Turn your eyes upon Jesus, look full in His wonderful face, and the things of earth will grow strangely dim, in the light of His glory and grace.'
