We stand as the ministers enter during the opening hymn.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

All Amen.

The Greeting

The president greets the people

The Lord be with youAlland also with you.

(or)

Grace, mercy and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ be with you

All and also with you.

Words of introduction may be said.

Prayer of Preparation

The following prayer may be said

All Almighty God,

to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hidden: cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy name; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

6 Lent

Prayers of Penitence

To prepare ourselves to celebrate the presence of Christ in word and sacrament, the president invites us to call to mind and confess our sins.

A pause for silent reflection follows. After the silence, one of the following forms of confession is used

All Father eternal, giver of light and grace, we have sinned against you and against our neighbour, in what we have thought, in what we have said and done, through ignorance, through weakness, through our own deliberate fault. We have wounded your love, and marred your image in us. We are sorry and ashamed, and repent of all our sins. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, who died for us, forgive us all that is past; and lead us out from darkness to walk as children of light. Amen.

(*or*)

Wash me thoroughly from my wickedness and cleanse me from my sin. Lord, have mercy.

All Lord, have mercy.

Make me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me. Christ have mercy.

All Christ have mercy.

Cast me not away from your presence and take not your holy spirit from me. Lord, have mercy.

All Lord, have mercy.

The president gives the absolution using these or other suitable words

May the Father of all mercies cleanse you from your sins, and restore you in his image to the praise and glory of his name, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

All Amen.

The **Kyrie Eleison**, an ancient prayer for Divine mercy, may be said or sung here if it has not already been incorporated in the prayers of penitence.

Lord, have mercy.

All Lord, have mercy.

Christ, have mercy.

The hymn of praise, Gloria in Excelsis (page 50), may be said or sung to celebrate the Annunciation of Our Lord. It is also said or sung on Maundy Thursday to mark the start of the Triduum, the three great days of Holy Week.

The Collect

The president introduces a period of silent prayer with the words 'let us pray' or a more specific bidding.

The president says the Collect, which expresses the theme of the day's celebration, and all respond

All Amen.

The Liturgy of the Word

Readings

We sit for the readings. Either one or two readings from Scripture precede the Gospel reading.

At the end the reader says

This is the word of the Lord. *All* **Thanks be to God.**

A *psalm* may follow the first reading.

A hymn may be sung.

Gospel Reading

We stand for the proclamation of the Gospel.

The following or another suitable acclamation may herald the Gospel reading

Praise to you, O Christ, King of eternal glory. The Lord is a great God, O that today you would listen to his voice. Harden not your hearts.

All Praise to you, O Christ, King of eternal glory.

When the Gospel is announced the reader says

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to *N*. *All* **Glory to you, O Lord.**

At the end

This is the Gospel of the Lord. *All* **Praise to you, O Christ.**

The Sermon

We sit for the sermon.

The Creed

We stand to declare our faith in God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

All We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

> We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven. was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Prayers of Intercession

The president introduces the Prayers of Intercession with these or similar words

In the power of the Spirit and in union with Christ, let us pray to the Father.

We kneel or sit for the prayers.

The following or other suitable responses may be used

Lord, in your mercy

All hear our prayer.

(or)

Lord, hear us *All* **Lord, graciously hear us.**

And at the end

Merciful Father,

All accept these prayers for the sake of your Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen.

Alternatively, the following form of intercession may be used

For forgiveness for the many times we have denied Jesus, let us pray to the Lord.

All Lord, have mercy.

For grace to seek out those habits of sin which mean spiritual death, and by prayer and self-discipline to overcome them, let us pray to the Lord.

All Lord, have mercy.

For Christian people, that through the suffering of disunity there may grow a rich union in Christ, let us pray to the Lord.

All Lord, have mercy.

For those who make laws, interpret them, and administer them, that our common life may be ordered in justice and mercy, let us pray to the Lord.

All Lord, have mercy.

For those who have the courage and honesty to work openly for justice and peace, let us pray to the Lord.

All Lord, have mercy.

For those in the darkness and agony of isolation, that they may find support and encouragement, let us pray to the Lord.

All Lord, have mercy.

For those who, weighed down with hardship, failure, or sorrow, feel that God is far from them, let us pray to the Lord.

All Lord, have mercy.

For those who are tempted to give up the way of the cross, let us pray to the Lord.

All Lord, have mercy.

That we, with those who have died in faith, may find mercy in the day of Christ, let us pray to the Lord.

All Lord, have mercy.

Holy God, holy and strong, holy and immortal, have mercy upon us.

The Liturgy of the Sacrament

The Peace

We stand for the Peace.

The president may introduce the Peace with a suitable sentence.

The peace of the Lord be always with you *All* **and also with you.**

These words may be added

Let us offer one another a sign of peace.

All may exchange a sign of peace.

Preparation of the Altar and the Gifts

During a **hymn** the gifts of bread and wine, which by the power of the Holy Spirit will become for us the body and blood of Christ, are brought to the altar. A collection for the work of the Church may also be taken.

As the gifts of bread and wine are placed on the altar the following or other suitable prayers may be used

Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation: through your goodness we have this bread to offer, which earth has given and human hands have made. It will become for us the bread of life.

All Blessed be God for ever.

Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation: through your goodness we have this wine to offer, fruit of the vine and work of human hands. It will become for us our spiritual drink.

All Blessed be God for ever.

The Eucharistic Prayer [A]

The 'preface' [enclosed in brackets] is replaced by the preface on page 45 from the Fifth Sunday of Lent until the Wednesday of Holy Week, page 44 for the Annunciation of Our Lord, and page 49 for Maundy Thursday.

The Lord be with you(or)The Lord is here.Alland also with you.His Spirit is with us.

Lift up your hearts.

All We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

All It is right to give thanks and praise.

Preface

[It is indeed right and good to give you thanks and praise, almighty God and everlasting Father, through Jesus Christ your Son.
For when he humbled himself
to come among us in human flesh,
he fulfilled the plan you formed before
the foundation of the world
to open for us the way of salvation.
Confident that your promise will be fulfilled,
we now watch for the day
when Christ our Lord will come again in glory.
And so we join our voices with angels and archangels
and with all the company of heaven
to proclaim your glory,
for ever praising you and *saying*:]

All Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest.

All kneel or sit.

Accept our praises, heavenly Father, through your Son our Saviour Jesus Christ, and as we follow his example and obey his command, grant that by the power of your Holy Spirit these gifts of bread and wine may be to us his body and his blood;

who, in the same night that he was betrayed, took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way, after supper he took the cup and gave you thanks; he gave it to them, saying: Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

Therefore, heavenly Father, we remember his offering of himself made once for all upon the cross; we proclaim his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension; we look for the coming of your kingdom, and with this bread and this cup we make the memorial of Christ your Son our Lord. Christ is the bread of life:

All When we eat this bread and drink this cup, we proclaim your death, Lord Jesus, until you come in glory.

(or)

Praise to you, Lord Jesus:

All Dying you destroyed our death, rising you restored our life: Lord Jesus, come in glory.

(or)

Great is the mystery of faith:

All Christ has died: Christ is risen: Christ will come again.

> Accept through him, our great high priest, this our sacrifice of thanks and praise, and as we eat and drink these holy gifts in the presence of your divine majesty, renew us by your Spirit, inspire us with your love and unite us in the body of your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

Through him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, with all who stand before you in earth and heaven, we worship you, Father almighty, in songs of everlasting praise:

All Blessing and honour and glory and power be yours for ever and ever. Amen.

The Lord's Prayer

Let us pray with confidence as our Saviour has taught us

All Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread.
And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us.
And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil.
For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever.
Amen.

(*or*)

As our Saviour taught us, so we pray

All Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread, Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us.
Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil.
For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and for ever.
Amen. The president breaks the consecrated bread.

We break this bread to share in the body of Christ.

All Though we are many, we are one body, because we all share in one bread.

(or)

Every time we eat this bread and drink this cup,

All we proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

The Agnus Dei may be said or sung as the bread is broken

All Lamb of God,

you take away the sin of the world, have mercy on us.

Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world, have mercy on us.

Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world, grant us peace.

(or)

All Jesus, Lamb of God, have mercy on us.

> Jesus, bearer of our sins, have mercy on us.

Jesus, redeemer of the world, grant us peace.

Giving of Communion

The president invites the people to receive communion. Those who have not been confirmed are invited to come to the altar for a blessing.

Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. Blessed are those who are called to his supper.

All Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word, and I shall be healed.

(or)

Draw near with faith. Receive the body of our Lord Jesus Christ which he gave for you, and his blood which he shed for you. Eat and drink in remembrance that Christ died for you, and feed on him in your hearts by faith with thanksgiving.

(or)

God's holy gifts for God's holy people

All Jesus Christ is holy, Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. All We do not presume

to come to this your table, merciful Lord, trusting in our own righteousness, but in your manifold and great mercies. We are not worthy so much as to gather up the crumbs under your table. But you are the same Lord whose nature is always to have mercy. Grant us therefore, gracious Lord, so to eat the flesh of your dear Son Jesus Christ and to drink his blood, that our sinful bodies may be made clean by his body, and our souls washed through his most precious blood, and that we may evermore dwell in him, and he in us. Amen.

The president and people receive communion. Upon receiving communion the communicant replies

Amen.

During communion hymns and anthems may be sung.

Prayer after Communion

After a period of silence, a post communion prayer is said. One of the following prayers of thanksgiving is then said

All Almighty God,

we thank you for feeding us with the body and blood of your Son Jesus Christ. Through him we offer you our souls and bodies to be a living sacrifice. Send us out in the power of your Spirit to live and work to your praise and glory. Amen.

(*or*)

All Father of all,

we give you thanks and praise, that when we were still far off you met us in your Son and brought us home. Dying and living, he declared your love, gave us grace, and opened the gate of glory. May we who share Christ's body live his risen life; we who drink his cup bring life to others; we whom the Spirit lights give light to the world. Keep us firm in the hope you have set before us, so we and all your children shall be free, and the whole earth live to praise your name; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Dismissal

The president may use either of the following blessings, or another suitable blessing. There is no blessing at the end of the Maundy Thursday liturgy.

May God the Father, who does not despise the broken spirit, give you a contrite heart.

All Amen.

May Christ, who bore our sins in his body on the tree, heal you by his wounds.

All Amen.

May the Holy Spirit, who leads us into all truth, speak to you words of pardon and peace.

All Amen.

And the blessing of God almighty, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be among you and remain with you always.

All Amen.

(or)

Christ give you grace to grow in holiness, to deny yourselves, take up your cross, and follow him; and the blessing of God almighty, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be among you and remain with you always.

All Amen.

We stand for the final **hymn**.

Go in peace to love and serve the Lord.

All In the name of Christ. Amen.

The ministers and people depart.

From the Fifth Sunday of Lent until the Wednesday of Holy Week

Gospel Acclamation

For as the time of his passion and resurrection draws near the whole world is called to acknowledge his hidden majesty. He is the victim who dies no more, the Lamb once slain, who lives for ever, our advocate in heaven to plead our cause, exalting us there to join with angels and archangels, for ever praising you and *saying*:

Commemoration of the Lord's Entry into Jerusalem

On Palm Sunday the Church celebrates Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem. The Eucharist on this day may begin with the following Liturgy of Palms.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

All Amen.

The president greets the people

The Lord be with you

All and also with you.

The following introduction may be said

Dear friends in Christ, during Lent we have been preparing by works of love and self-sacrifice for the celebration of our Lord's death and resurrection. Today we come together to begin this solemn celebration in union with the Church throughout the world. Christ enters his own city to complete his work as our Saviour, to suffer, to die, and to rise again. Let us go with him in faith and love, so that, united with him in his sufferings, we may share his risen life.

The following or another prayer may be said

God our Saviour, whose Son Jesus Christ entered Jerusalem as Messiah to suffer and to die, bless these palms that they may be for us signs of his victory; and grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever.

All Amen.

The account of the Lord's entrance into Jerusalem is proclaimed from one of the four gospels.

When the Gospel is announced the reader says

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to *N*. *All* **Glory to you, O Lord.**

At the end

This is the Gospel of the Lord. *All* **Praise to you, O Christ.**

If there is a procession, the president says

Let us go forth, praising Jesus our Messiah.

During the procession all hold palms in their hands, and appropriate hymns may be sung.

The Eucharist continues with the Collect on page 8.

Maundy Thursday

Gospel Acclamation

Praise to you, O Christ, King of eternal glory. I give you a new commandment, says the Lord: Love one another as I have loved you.

All Praise to you, O Christ, King of eternal glory.

The Washing of Feet

Love and service are the two great themes of Maundy Thursday. To demonstrate his love and humility our Lord knelt and washed his disciples' feet, bidding them to do likewise to one another.

We too are called to a life of humble service. This may be symbolised in the Maundy Thursday liturgy by the Washing of Feet.

The Washing of Feet may end with this prayer

Almighty Father, whose Son Jesus Christ taught us that what we do for the least of our brethren we do also for him: give us the will to be the servant of others as he was the servant of all, who gave up his life and died for us, yet is alive and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

All Amen.

The service continues with the Prayers of Intercession on page 11.

Preface

It is indeed right to give you thanks, Father most holy, through Jesus Christ our Lord. For on this night he girded himself with a towel and, taking the form of a servant, washed the feet of his disciples. He gave us a new commandment that we should love one another as he has loved us. Knowing that his hour had come, in his great love he gave this supper to his disciples to be a memorial of his passion, that we might proclaim his death until he comes again, and feast with him in his kingdom. Therefore earth unites with heaven to sing a new song of praise; we too join with angels and archangels as they proclaim your glory without end:

The Eucharistic prayer continues with the Sanctus [Holy, Holy, Holy] *on page* 14.

There is no blessing at the end of the Maundy Thursday liturgy.

At the end of the liturgy, in preparation for the solemnity of Good Friday, the altars are stripped and all hangings removed.

After the Last Supper Jesus went with his disciples to pray in the Garden of Gethsemane. He asked Peter, James and John to watch with him. In memory of this a Watch of prayer may be kept after the Maundy Thursday liturgy. The Blessed Sacrament may be placed on an Altar of Repose as a focus for our prayers.

All Glory to God in the highest, and peace to his people on earth.

> Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory.

Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer.

For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.
