


## St Mary's Eco Questionnaire

Is there anything else that you would like to tell us about the food you buy?

18 responses

I will choose Eco friendly options if they are available in the supermarket but I don't go out of my way to visit local stores (eg. farm shops) - time does not permit

I try to buy without petrol miles. Food miles is a difficult one. Is it possible some UK food has hidden miles (travelling between distribution centres)? Are some locations (IoW for tomatoes) any better than produce from the Netherlands?

much depends upon place of purchase

I alwasys try to buy locally produced vegetables

It is more difficult to buy unwrapped food in all our local supermarkets in the last year.

Do try to eat more vegetables and less meat and buy free range eggs

I try to finish the food on my plate.

I am vegan with a ? for organic veg and fruit

I do my best to buy ethically, but it is very expensive and I can't always afford to

Price is becoming the most important factor now

We mostly shop in Aldi because it is cheap and good quality. They use a lot of plastic wrapping. I am pleased that Tesco's have introduced reusable fruit bags.

I use a butcher n Keddington, twice a month. For church events, I cook the meat. You wil notice that in some supermarkets everything is packaged now.

Have never eaten much meat - almost a vegetarian.

The questions don't identify a respondent's existing benchmark. I already eat more fish and vegetarian food than meat thus my scope to 'cut down on meat' is limited.


I don't cut down on dairy - need calcium from milk particularly. We avoid processed food.

We only buy what we know we will eat.

We rarely buy processed food, nearly always cook from scratch and balance meat, fish, chicken and pasta dishes.

I look for value for money.











Is there anything else that you would like to tell us about the clothes you use?

I buy second hand clothes rather then brand new

I will always put washing in the garden if the weather is dry. I have always tried to restrict the number of clothes I buy and to use them for a long time (eg. 5-10 years if not more) but I have not changed my behaviour recently.

Buy used from charity shops as much as possible. Rarely buy new. Unusable garments go to BHF shop in SW.

My choices are limited by budget restrictions

I make old clothes last as long as possible. I give away many garments that I find I no longer use. Normally to Salvation Army Collection site

Wash clothes less frequently

Again, a luxury I can no longer afford so not an issue!

Don't posses a tumble drier and trying to limit clothing purchases of new items. Buy infrequently and mostly second hand

I dress for warmth, not for style.

Dry washing on my line for years. Less water use, no hose pipes and collect water.

I use a hanging drying horse or outside line. Sunlight damages fibres. I launder curtains roughly twice a year and they last some almost 30 years. Good quality underwear. Skirts are handmade. At times it is possible to turn a skirt inside out and remake it! Towards the end, clothes are fit for the garden and then the bin, buttons and bits removed!

I but more clothes from charity shops than I used to.

Don't have a tumble dryer but avoid spinning by drying washing outside.


When I buy a new item of clothing I aim to pass on a similar item to a charity shop, assuming it is reasonable condition.

No tumble drier! I wash clothes less frequently than I used to and wash by hand where possible except for large loads like bedding. We de=ry washing outside whenever possible.


We 'cascade' smart clothes to working clothes i.e. gardening/conservation work.

I use charity shops. I avoid using a tumble drier since solar panels were installed!











Is there anything else that you would like to tell us about how you travel?

I plan to buy an electric car when I can plug it in at home.

Living in a village with very poor public transport means I have to use the car to travel anywhere. I have cut back on flying for pleasure in recent years.

I do try to avoid driving but in this area some journeys are impossible otherwise. I haven't flown since 2016 and that's choice rather than Covid, but I can't commit to not flying at all. Electric vs petrol: the energy and build cost has to come from somewhere. Ideally I'd not own one, or join a car sharing scheme. My car sits mostly on the driveway, used max twice a week, at most 3k miles a year.

Budget restrictions leave little options for change

My annual car mileage is greatly reduced since the pandemic

Would love to see cars banned from Saffron Walden

I might buy an electric car when I need to replace my existing car - but its perfectly fine for now!

Walk. All the old cars will go elsewhere.

My driving days are coming to an end - I will not replace my current car

I might buy an electric car when they are safer (they are known to go up in smoke rapidly if there is a problem!) and when there are more sustainable options for powering them and maintaining them for a long period of time.

I have to fly thousands of miles to visit my son's. I have to drive a lot to ferry my grandchildren daily. But I could walk to church if I left in good time.

What is done with the old cars? In a village there is no choice. I drive generally 40--50 mph except on motorways. I drive in neutral down hills, use my gears a lot and hope to fill up every 4 weeks. I drive a Passat Estate and get almost 50mpg.

I wuld like to see government investment in public transport. Busses and trains subsidised, more frequent, affordable. Ideally public transport would be 1st choice not car.

Not convinced that electric car is right, sustainable answer. Our rural setting (no buses etc) limits out travel options.




I aim to keep my current car as long as possible!


The recharging infrastructure is totally inadequate, Re Flying - it os impossible to travel to many destinations, other than by flying, Why is the church not taking an initiative by encouraging church members to walk, cycle or car-share when attending to church? There are only 2 cycle racks, frequently hemmed in by parked cars. We need more!

I have not flown for 10 years and do not intend to fly again. This has meant deliberately rethinking holidays and accepting there are some places I will never see. We plan journeys much more than we used to (eg several errands in a single trip). Using public transport is a problem in the countryside and 'wherever possible' has to be balanced by 'wherever reasonable'. May car is now 17 years old and has done over 120,000 miles. I've decided the most environmentally friendly approach is now to run it into the ground.

I rent so can't make any choices about insulation, solar panels etc but I would invest in them if I could


Rental so I have little control over it



Ain't got no savings!


Lol what savings

I don't have any savings. I support Water aid.


It's quite difficult to know where savings are invested by a savings provider without a lot of digging.
