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The Rector's Letter

From The Rev'd Jeremy Trew Jeremy writes...

September is, as always, a busy month; full of all the meetings and events that the new school term generates. I'll let you in on a secret: I'm always glad when it is over. Now we come to October and the Church can pause for breath and take a look ahead at the various celebrations and commemorations to come in November through All Saints, All Souls and Remembrance Sunday, and beyond those; Christmas.



In October the Parishes of Debden and Wimbish, and the whole Team, will be welcoming our new minister, Rev'd Lynda Sebbage. Lynda will be licensed by Bishop Guli on Thursday 24th October at Debden Church. Please hold Lynda in your prayers. Lynda is an experienced Priest who brings with her many gifts that will strengthen her two Churches and support the wider Team. It may be tempting to hope that things will continue as before now a replacement priest is installed. But Lynda is not John. We trust that just as God called John elsewhere, God also called Lynda here, with her particular gifts and character. This is part of God's work of re-creation: "Behold, I will do a new thing" (Isaiah 43:19).

At the end of September we shall have said goodbye to Matt Williamson. Matt has worked in the Team for a number of years as our Youth and Children's Leader. He has done a terrific job of engaging with young people of all ages, in our churches, schools and the wider community. As with many ministers, much of his best work is hidden away from public gaze. I know that he has touched the lives of many with Gospel hope, and I am thankful for that. He goes to be Youth, Children and Families Advisor for this Diocese. Please hold him, and the family, in your prayers at this time. How shall we continue and grow what Matt has been leading? I hope we will recruit a new person, but their role will be necessarily different from the one Matt was recruited to. What should it look like?

I suspect that many churchgoers have a secret suspicion that their faith is irrelevant in a modern world; that they have nothing to say or offer. That is why their faith has become private and internalised and its expression must be preserved at all costs. Instead, we should have confidence to own our faith in the God who calls and sends, and seek to apply it in relevant ways. However, becoming outward looking can seem like an enormous task; one

too big to tackle. We shouldn't be discouraged. Our Church celebrations and commemorations in Autumn only have meaning if we are able to look beyond them to the story of Christmas, of God getting off his throne and mucking in with our world in all its faded glory. That's the beginning of the salvation story. God entrusted his Church to continue with what he had started; to put rich meaning into the events of life by getting our hands dirty a little. When we do that we church-safe Christians may find that we are indeed standing on Holy ground, wherever God may call us to be.

"Behold, I will do a new thing; now it shall spring forth; shall ye not know it? I will even make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." Isaiah 43:19

In 2019, when the PCC was considering whether there was any longer a need for a parish magazine in an era of social media, blogging and the Internet, it was felt that there was still an opening for a more permanent, physical record of proceedings and a diary of forthcoming events. The Rev'd Canon John Sibson, who had edited the Parish News for some 14 years, felt that the time was right to make way for a fresh approach, and the Reverend Canon David Tomlinson, then the Rector, persuaded recently-retired Andy Colebrooke to take up the post. With Andy, and with the help of the Diocesan Print Unit in Chelmsford, came a thoroughly professional, well produced and well illustrated monthly magazine. In his first edition, he expressed the hope that the new look Parish News would "encourage even more interest in this vibrant Christian community in the heart of Saffron Walden."

In his last edition (August-September) of Parish News, Andy described the 5 years of his tenure of the Editor's chair as "happy". Given that this period included not only a lengthy "interregnum, without a rector" and the unprecedented closure of churches on account of the pandemic, this is testament to his invariably sunny disposition and ability to make the most of life's opportunities. Together with Hazel, he has established a periodical which has given information and pleasure in equal measure, and we are all very grateful for his energy, enthusiasm and creativity.

Hamish Walker 1934—2024

As Hamish was fond of saying, he was "made in Hong Kong", where his father was a manager in the Chartered Bank and his mother a nurse in the colony's main hospital. Proud Scots, they decided their baby should be born in Scotland. In 1934, travel from the Far East was normally made by sea, but when, after 6 weeks, Hamish's pregnant mother reached Southampton, she received a cable saying that her husband was dangerously ill. In those days, aeroplanes could not fly at night and it took ten days to reach Singapore (about ten hours nowadays - how things have changed!). Hong Kong did not have an airfield so the last bit of the journey had to be made by sea which took a further week. And she arrived two days too late.

Having arranged the funeral and sorted out matters in Hong Kong, Hamish's mother took another six weeks sea voyage back to the UK, and Hamish was duly born in his father's family home in Glasgow in time for Hogmanay!

Although Hamish therefore never knew his father, there were a number of similarities between them. Hamish was also a bank manager, took part extensively in amateur theatricals and was described as being "an enthusiastic organiser". Hamish's father was also a fine golfer with a handicap of 3; what might not Hamish have accomplished had he taken up the game?

Hamish grew up in Surrey, where his mother moved to be near her sister. He went to school at a prep school near Chertsey, followed by Charterhouse. After National Service in the RAF, he applied to become an announcer for BBC Radio and no one who heard him reading the lesson in church could be surprised to learn that he passed the initial audition. The BBC were not recruiting for 6 months, however, and he was told to find something to do in the interim. He took a job at the Bank of England and was enjoying life so much that he decided to stay, remaining there for almost 40 years. This included two years where he was lucky enough to be seconded to the Bahamas, setting up a new Central Bank in Nassau, a high-point of his career.

A friend who was a member of the Bank's Operatic Society took Hamish along to a play-reading one evening and he spotted a girl with dark hair in a bun who was one of the Stage Managers for the Society. Three years later he married her. Fortunate in so many things, Hamish was especially blessed in his marriage of more than 50 years with Susan. They complemented each other in many ways (Susan could cook and Hamish could spell - as friends of Susan would joke). They set up home in East Sheen and, finding themselves unable to have children, they were lucky enough (that word again!) to be chosen to adopt six-week-old twins, James and Joanna. In 1966 the family moved to Little

Walden, so that the children, like their parents, should grow up in the countryside.

Employees of the Bank of England were encouraged to contribute their talents to their local communities. In Little Walden, he audited the accounts of the local WI, the church and the Village Hall, later becoming its Treasurer and subsequently its Chairman. For six years, he used his booming voice to good effect as the Saffron Walden Town Crier, following a public audition in the Market Square.

Hamish and Susan continued their connection with the stage, joining the Saffron Walden Society which Hamish served as Treasurer for 6 years, Chairman for a similar period and finally as the Society's President, a post from which he retired in 2007. He also directed six of the Society's shows, appearing almost every year on stage as a principal or in the chorus.

Not content with performing, Hamish became a Regional Representative for the National Operatic and Dramatic Association, the umbrella organisation for Amateur Societies in the UK, which involved him in travelling around East Anglia, from the Thames to the Humber, encouraging Societies and writing reviews of their shows. He also served as Chairman of the National Committee of those Regional Representatives, and, more briefly, as Advertising Manager for NODA news.

Of equal importance was his contribution to St Mary's. He served as Secretary of the Parochial Church Council for 8 years, he helped Gordon Smith set up the Music Association, he sang in the choir, he was Editor of the Parish Magazine for 6 years, he was a volunteer in the Parish Office for about 10 years, he acted as Verger at funerals for 15 years and as sub-deacon at the 8 o'clock (BCP) service for more than 30 years. He revised and edited the History of St Mary's Church produced in the year 2000 and acted as chief guide for visitors to the church for twenty years. Naturally, he was frequently called on for readings at carol services and other events.

When he was selected to serve in the Bahamas, one of his friends said, "If you fell off the Eiffel Tower you would land on your feet!". Hamish has another explanation, however. He well remembers his mother telling him on more than one occasion: "When you were born, I plonked you onto God and said "Father, you have given me this baby. I'll feed him, but it's up to you to look after him!" After hearing Hamish's story, I think we can all agree that, as they say in the Bahamas, "Lord, you done good, man!".

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Recent Gifts to St Mary's





I have been asked to write something about some recent gifts that I have made to St Mary's this year. They comprise a silver Chalice and Paten, and a Ciborium which can hold about 50 wafers. See the above photos. They were gifts to my father the Rev'd Tom Hugall from his mother and newly married wife on the occasion of their marriage, before they left England in 1947 to serve in a parish in Cape Town in South Africa. (My parents met and got married when they were both serving in the RAF in Berlin just after the end of the war where my father was a Padre and my mother a morse code operator.)

The Chalice and Ciborium were used regularly by my father in his 14 year ministry in Cape Town until his untimely death at the age of 47 in 1961 from MND. They have been kept ever since in case one of the family might decide to take holy orders, but this is now unlikely. It is lovely to see them being used again after 60+ years, in services here in St Mary's, in particular the Sunday 8am and the Wednesday 9.30am where they are I am told 'just the right size'. They were newly made in solid silver by church metalworkers in London and both have a fairly modern look with a light beaten finish. I am also pleased that Debden Church has found a home for the small brass lectern.

Our local Cemetery is a peaceful space which offers a natural environment for all types of wildlife and as a result is an important nature conservation resource in the town. Daily maintenance and gardening are carried out which ensures the space is both clean and tidy, where residents and visitors can visit for peace and reflection.



The Cemetery is divided into different areas; Lawn cemetery, Traditional area, Garden of Remembrance, scattered ashes, and areas for children and young people. There is also a separate section for War graves which is cared for by The Commonwealth War Graves Commission. A small well-appointed Chapel is available to hire.

Much of the current layout and proportions of the structure dates from the first Norman Abbot, Paul of Caen (1077-1093). The tower is the only 11th century great crossing tower still standing in England. The original ringing chamber had 5 bells, none of which have survived. Currently there are 23 bells housed in the Tower.

The Great Rose win-

dow in the North Transept is a more modern highlight gifted in 1988-89 by the local firm Laporte to celebrate their anniversary, replacing the original clear glass. Too many other beautiful features to mention. We then had a lunch at The Waterside Inn in Ware from where we boarded a boat for a 2 hour commentated trip along the river Lee in the sunshine.

We will be planning another Cathedral visit in the Spring.

Andy Colebrooke

Born in St Albans, Andy went to Imperial College, London (BSc, PhD) hoping for a career in science, but after 5 years on a research reactor in the east end of London (now the site of the 2012 Olympic Stadium), he realised it wouldn't be his long-term occupation. He had enjoyed a bit of teaching, so with Hazel's consent he became a student again, to gain a teaching qualification. In 12 years of



teaching maths, in two quite tough comprehensive schools, Andy found teaching was a far more dangerous occupation than nuclear reactor science!

Hazel and Andy had met when students in London and married in 1974 to settle in Bush Hill Park, north London, where their two boys Simon and Daniel were born. After a few years they took what seemed at the time a huge risk and moved out to the village of Stebbing, near Great Dunmow. There their daughter Joanna was born, at the start of 15 very happy years, learning to appreciate the value of a small community. Hazel encouraged Andy to attend events at Stebbing Church resulting in his faith coming alive in a loving fellowship with inspirational teaching. Andy's faith grew stronger, so with Hazel and others they led a Pathfinders' youth group and weekends away. Encouraged to explore ordination, and again with Hazel's backing, Andy left work to train for the ministry at Ridley Hall in Cambridge. Ordination followed in 1994 with a curacy in Colchester, then a first incumbency in Manningtree on the River Stour, before crossing the diocese to live in Great Chishill as rector of seven villages – 'a little bit of heaven next to the M11' – and perhaps the happiest period of the couple's life since leaving Stebbing. A lot happened on a personal level during those ministry years – both sets of parents died, and all three children were married.

On retirement in 2016, they came to live in the town because it is well situated to be near the three children and their growing families (7 marvellous grandchildren). Although they miss village life the benefits of Saffron Walden are many –Saffron Hall and Saffron Screen; library and shops in walking distance; of course, St Mary's and its surrounding churches; new friends to get to know and

much more. When he can Andy attends the walk of witness on Good Friday which is always a moving event. A day that sticks in his memory is Remembrance Day 2020 when he led the 11am online service from a locked St Mary's with only 5 or 6 others, including the Commanding Officer from Carver Barracks. Strange times.

As for everyone, life has its triumphs and its failures. Since becoming a Christian Andy has come to see that God works through all of it, even the bad can be an opportunity to learn or empathise. So, his coat of arms would say, 'Nothing is Wasted'


A Prayer for October

From Parish News, October 1944

We hear a great deal about the duty of the Church to the returning demobilised troops. In this connection one need hardly say we shall welcome them cordially at our services.

I received lately a very interesting letter from the Superintendent of our Boy's Sunday School, Mr Albert Fitch, now serving with the forces in Italy. He describes his experiences in a rest camp by the sea-side a few miles from a fairly large seaport. Among the amenities there were bathing, swimming, water polo, a cinema, a hippodrome, a canteen, facilities for billiards, table tennis and listening to the wireless and last but not least a Camp Church with a very nice padre who supplied three services on Sundays and a Bible Class on Sundays. What's in a name? (2)

This month I thought we might explore how some of the roads on the new estate near Tesco's got their names. Once again, I cannot explore them all and this time I have chosen Leverett Way, Campling Street, Eddystone Avenue and Wallace Road..

Leverett Way is named after the Leverett family who were important in the town for several hundred years. They were successful tradesmen in the eighteenth century with businesses including bakery, grocery, ironmongery and, more unusually, peruke making and malting. Many described themselves as gentlemen, serving as aldermen and mayors of Saffron Walden. When the rood screen was erected in St Mary's church, one of the churchwardens was a member of the Leverett family. If you look carefully, among the various carvings you will find a Leverett. No, not one of the family, but a young hare.



Campling Street is named after William
Campling who was High or Chief Constable of Saffron
Walden in 1849 in the days before there was a county
police force. William was unfortunate enough to be
shot on his own doorstep in Bridge Street. He
survived a few days but died of his wounds. Although
a young man was charged with the crime, he was
found 'Not Guilty' and the case still remains unsolved.
There is a plaque commemorating William Campling

on the bridge over the Slade near the Eight Bells giving details of the crime.

Eddystone Avenue is called after a place, not a person. I am sure you will have heard of the Eddystone Lighthouse, but what has that got to do with Saffron Walden? Well, the very first Eddystone Lighthouse was built by

a Walden man, Henry Winstanley. Winstanley was born in Museum Street, where there is a blue plaque commemorating him, and spent his early career working for Thomas Howard, Earl of Suffolk, at Audley End where he was responsible for a set of twenty-four engravings of the house. After being shipwrecked on the Eddystone Rocks, Winstanley designed and built the lighthouse but while he was



working on the rocks in 1703 a terrible storm blew up which destroyed the lighthouse and killed Winstanley.

And finally, Wallace Road. Wallace Road is probably named after

Saffron Walden's own lion, Wallace, who now lives in Saffron Walden Museum. Wallace was the first African lion to be born in Britain. He became part of Wombwell's travelling menagerie and, when he died, he was stuffed and given to the museum. It is said that he may have been the inspiration for the poem 'Albert and the Lion'. You can still visit Wallace in Saffron Walden Museum.
